












CHECKING NORJAM OUT

We plumped for a classic pepperoni, alongside some extremely cheesy dough balls. The pizza was perfectly cooked, with a lovely tang on the pepperoni.

The dough balls had a very generous helping of melted cheese - so would not be particularly healthy - but who's calorie counting on a jamboree?

Halloumi Norjam Special

We opted for the vegetarian food truck option and sampled the Norjam Halloumi Special (available as chicken tenders too). After selecting from the multiple ingredients, you make up a truly personalised dish perfect for yourself.

We went for the peri fries over the plain (these did offer a little after kick), perfectly cooked halloumi batons, think soft and gooey and none of the squeaking you get when undercooked, combine this with home made coleslaw and a choice of gravy or dipping sauce and you have a feast in a lovely little tray.

Churros

These sweet treats are a firm favourite judging by the queue. And rightly so, the wait might be a little longer than you'd like but they are warm and sweet with the perfect blend of soft and crunchy.

You even get the choice of three dips; milk or dark chocolate and salted caramel.

A PLACE TO BREATHE

Down in the marketplace, there is an incredibly thoughtful and carefully created Spiritual Space. Designed to be both chilled and informative, it offers opportunities for calm, self-reflection, and learning.

Inside, you'll find a series of activities that encourage you to reflect on what matters most to you, explore your sense of self, and discover more about religions from across the world. The space not only brings together knowledge of different faiths but also broadens the conversation to spirituality as a whole - inviting reflection on hopes, dreams, and aspirations for the future.

There are 10 activities in total, starting with the self-reflection area, where you can pause to think about everything that makes you who you are. Here, you can take part in self-mantras, a reminder that "we are smarter and braver than we think." This reflection feels especially important at Norjam, where each day's challenges show us just how capable we are. You can also write down words or phrases to describe yourself and keep them as a reminder. This leads into creating your own Paracord Person - a small figure symbolising personal growth and the potential we all have, to create positive change.

Other activities include adding to a growing paper chain that represents unity, showing that we are stronger together. You can also visit the tree to add a leaf of resistance bearing the name of someone who supports, encourages and protects you.

Keeping with the theme of connection, you can add your hometown to a world map, celebrating the wide range of places we've all come from. You'll also find items and displays sharing fascinating facts about religions from across the globe.

The atmosphere is one of being "informed but not influenced," with an overwhelming sense of calm. As Tamsin from 1st Dersingham Guides said, "it's a really comforting space for people of all religions and backgrounds, it feels like a safe space." Amelia from Grey Alington agreed: "I like the paracord crafting especially, it's a fun and calm place to be.





It's a good place for a break and chill out area."

One of the most powerful activities here is the Tibetan Prayer Flags - where you can write a hope, dream, wish, or prayer and hang it in the breeze, sending your words into the universe.

Quiet corners are dotted throughout, including a beanbag circle and a spot for learning origami.

Next to the main tent, you'll find a purple tent dedicated to prayer. Open to everyone,

it's a place for private reflection or worship. Chaplains of many different faiths have already led services at Norjam, with a multifaith reflective service scheduled for Friday at 12:30 pm. The Spiritual Space team can tell you where it will be held.

If you can, take time out from the busyness of camp life to explore the Spiritual Space. With its welcoming atmosphere and thoughtful activities, it's a place for everyone - a space of comfort, calm, and connection.
